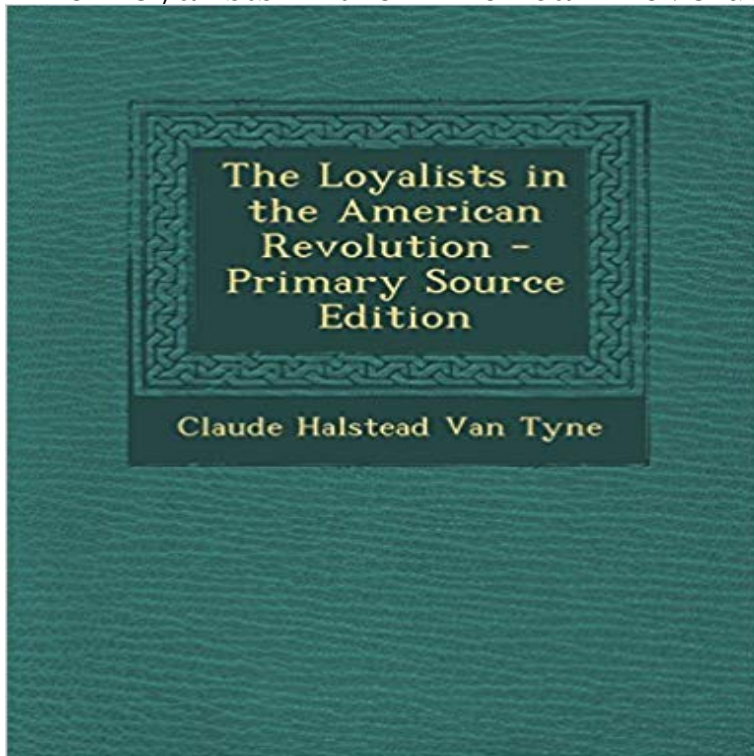


The Loyalists in the American Revolution
