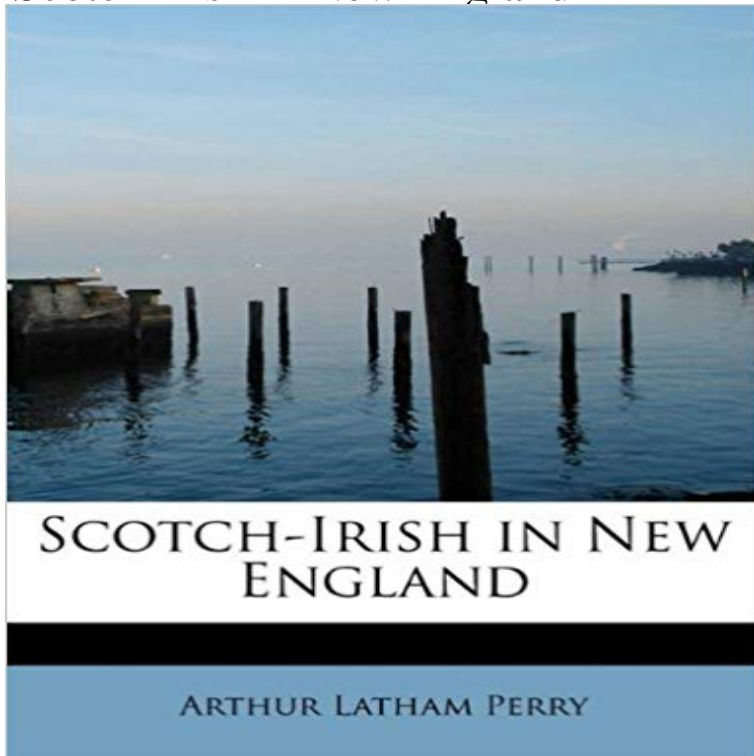


Scotch-Irish in New England
