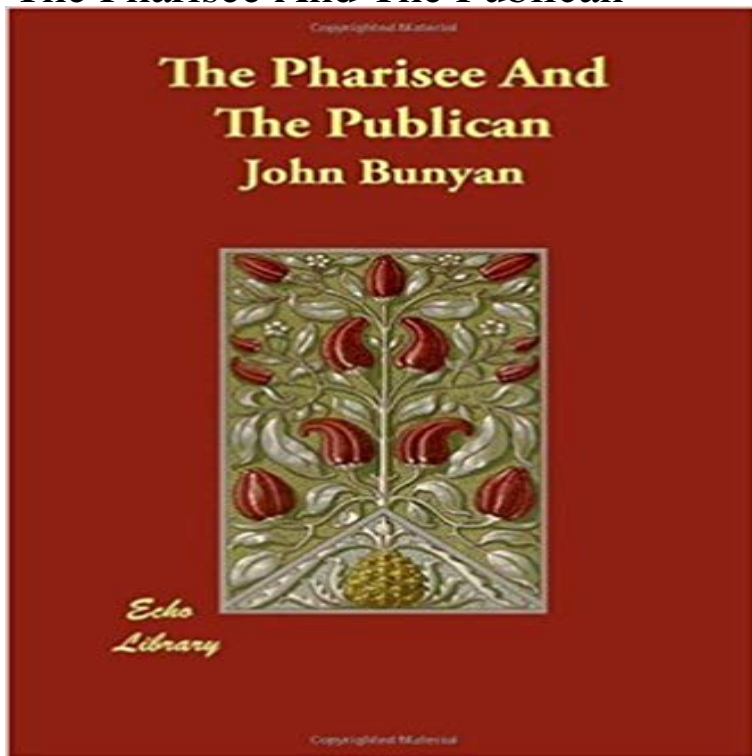


The Pharisee And The Publican
