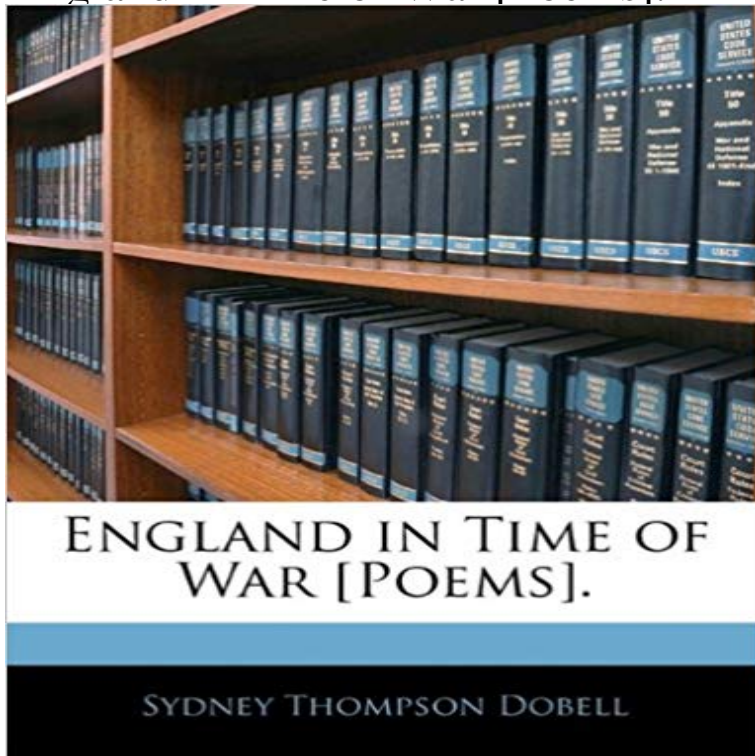


England in Time of War [Poems].
